- 265 Romantic Involvement: A Protective Factor for Psychological Health in Racially-Diverse Young Sexual Minorities

Marriage is a well-established protective factor for mental health among heterosexual adults. The present study suggests that romantic involvement is also associated with psychological well-being among young sexual minorities, particularly those who are also ethnic minorities and identify as gay or lesbian.

- 276 Working Memory Capacity in Social Anxiety Disorder: Revisiting Prior Conclusions

This study investigated working memory, which is the ability to keep information in mind while also performing a second task, in two groups of individuals with anxiety disorders as well as healthy control participants. This study failed to replicate previous findings that there were differences in working memory performance between these groups.

## Externalizing Disorders

- 282 Subjective Cannabis Effects as Part of a Developing Disorder in Adolescents and Emerging Adults

Expanding legalization of cannabis and swelling debate about the potential risks highlight the importance of understanding cannabis misuse in adolescents and emerging adults. This study suggests that youths with more severe cannabis-use problems respond differently to cannabis use in daily life, supporting some models of addiction development.

- 294 Psychopathic Men: Deficits in General Mental Ability, Not Emotion Perception

While psychopathy is characteristically associated with cognitive deficits in the ability to perceive emotions in the faces of others, evidence is actually mixed. We propose the mixed results are due to methodological shortcomings, which we address in the current study through the use of a large sample size, several psychometrically validated emotion perception cognitive tasks, and advanced statistical modeling. Through a series of tests, we show that emotion perception deficits are actually due to a deficit in general mental ability, thus challenging theories of emotion perception deficits in psychopathic persons.

## Disorders of Thought and Mania

- 305 Biological Motion Sensitivity, But Not Interpersonal Predictive Coding Is Impaired in Schizophrenia

Reduced ability to understand actions and intentions of other people is often observed in people with schizophrenia. This study shows that despite these deficits, individuals with schizophrenia do not differ from healthy controls in terms of ability to use information that is conveyed by a gesture of the agent to predict behavior of another agent.

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
